### President's Column....

Folks may be aware that the past two years have presented some challenges for me and my family. I won't go into detail, but there was divorce, a period of unemployment, and family illness. It came in a wave and seemed to drown out whatever good I had or would have. It was in the middle of this that Doug Rooks and Rev. Carie asked if I would take on the Vice-Presidency and (therefore) the Presidency for the following year.

They had thought about it. "Are you sure we should do this? He has a lot on his mind." I imagine them asking. "Yes, but he should probably have something *good* on his mind." I imagine them answering. (I don't presume to speak for Rev. Carie or Doug Rooks; you can ask them for their side of the story.)

And they were right. Doing the work of the church, becoming enmeshed in it, was the perfect palliative for what was ailing me. Sometimes it was just a distraction. Conversations about heating systems. Other times it was genuinely fulfilling, hard and honest work that made a difference. Supporting the work with migrant workers, or, dare I say it, putting together a budget that drives the mission and vision of UUCC. It felt good.

A good number of years ago, I was going through another of these waves of bad events. One of my daughters had been hospitalized and I was on the far end of distraught. This was just around the time when I was returning to the church after a hiatus of some years. I remember talking with Rev. Carie – who had visited my daughter – about Unitarian Universalists and pastoral care. When my mother was dying of cancer, she took comfort in her Christian church and her Bible and her prayer. "Where," I asked Rev. Carie, "Is the comfort to be found in the UU church?" This was a vitally important question for me. What is a church if not a place of comfort, refuge, or sanctuary?

There is no easy answer to that question ("It's in the kitchen."), except to say that *comfort is to be found, dependably, at our church.* Some people find it in the services, some in choir, some in one committee or another – all acts of collaboration and fellowship – some find it in the deep, life-long relationships, some in the new vibrant friendships. For some it's in small groups, for some in the nature walks, for some in RE.

These "everyday" relationships – and our church is thick with them – support an abundant system of comfort that is offered systemically – e.g., the Caring Committee, Pastoral Associates – or independently from congregant to friend to congregant.

Three times during my fifteen years at this church, I've had to walk through our doors and say, "I need help. I am in despair." Each time I found the help and the comfort I needed.

It's hard for many of us to ask for help. "Everyone has problems ..." or "I just need to get over myself ..." we say to ourselves. Asking for help can bring to mind Blanche DuBois, blithely depending on the kindness of strangers.

There come times in all our lives when we do depend on the kindness of strangers. Or the kindness of friends. Or the kindness of us. Three times I've required comfort and three times I've found it. If you are in despair, depend on us. Come to us. Talk with us. There is comfort to be found at UUCC.

Thank you to bakers, Liz and Corrina, as well as Jim and Helen McKendry.

We served a Mexican chili with garden salad (lettuce from Liz and Mike's garden), bread and desserts. The chili had lots of beans, veggies, spices, Liz's fine sausage and a little beef (thanks to Jim and Helen McKendry).

In the past our church has been responsible for just 3 meals in the summer. This year we agreed to produce and pay for 6 meals. However, because the St. Mark's congregation moved to the Prince of Peace church, 3 of the 4 people from the former St. Mark's congregation are no longer involved. Money is tight, changes have occurred and our church has been involved in all of the meals. Prince of Peace has given money and volunteers and so has UUCC.
