A Faith Journey...

In the August newsletter UUCC Board President, Martha Naber, uses the tree as metaphor to describe the layers of interconnectedness in our church community. The tree's growth rings represent the years in which this community has gathered to bring the grace of Love into the hearts and minds of the people of Maine's capital city and surrounding communities.

Martha's second wise act was distributing to the UUCC Board of Trustees the article "Bound in Covenant: Congregational Covenants are Declarations of Interdependence" where author Rev. Victoria Safford informs the reader of our Unitarian Universalist tradition, to walk together in faith... to walk together across disagreements, dissent, and difficult discernment, cherishing the way we walk as dearly as any outcome. This is no easy aspiration.

Little did she know her article opened the door to our monthly theme (Covenant) and provided a springboard into the eternal human aspiration to go deeper in relation to ourselves, to our best intention, to our God, and to each other... [to all of creation].

And Martha is not alone. Last year the Board of Trustees charged the newly formed Right Relations Work Group with the task of reviewing the current practices (and barriers) by which minister, leadership and members commit to being in right relationship with each other. That is to say, how do we, the members and friends of UUCC, covenant to walk together in faith?

This month the Soul Matters packet opens with these wise words from Rev. Gretchen Haley:

Covenant holds a whole vision for how to live in this complicated, beautiful and broken world. It is a vision that says we are most human when we bind ourselves in relationship. But not just any relationship – relationships of trust, mutual accountability and continual return. ...we become human through our promising, but also when we break those promises, and yet somehow find ways to reconnect and begin again – when we repair the relationship because we know we need each other, even when we think the other isn't doing enough, even when the other is annoying us, or isn't listening well, or isn't doing things the way we want them done – even then. When we realize right then, that we are still connected, and we can't give up – and so we return, and begin again. This beginning again, says our faith, is when the holy and the human meet.

Let me tell you right now, sometime in the next year, maybe in the next few minutes, the people you most believe in and care about are going to disappoint you. Your church is going to disappoint you. This world is surely going to disappoint you. Like, all the time. We all are walking wounded and weary from the way this world can — and does — break our hearts. And what our faith asks of us, what our faith imagines for us, is that somehow, right at that moment when our hearts break, we will find our way to see through that heartbreak. We will stay put — not close off, not run away, not hurt back — but keep on being in relationship, doing what we can to repair the world and each other, keep on opening our hearts with greater love. And, right then, our covenantal faith says — we will feel not only most human, but also most whole and most at home.

On September 11th we enter our sanctuary for the annual In-gathering ceremony with water from our summer sojourn. It is a time of recommitting ourselves to our Unitarian Universalist traditions and the shared ministry of this beloved congregation. I encourage you use this month's Soul Matters packet as way to reflect upon how you covenant to this faith and this community in a relationship of trust, mutual accountability and continual renewal.

New Hannaford Gift Card System Explained....

The new Hannaford card system may be confusing.

Hannaford has changed its policy so that members who want to use a credit card must buy a minimum of \$1,000 in order for the church to be eligible for a \$50 bonus.

However, Hannaford no longer sends the church a \$50 value card to sell in order to receive our

bonus. Hannaford now charges members only

\$950 on their credit card, but they receive \$1,000 in value loaded onto their gift cards. The remaining \$50 is payable to the UUCC in check or cash. You may also ask me to sell half of these cards for you, if all you want is \$500.

There is no minimum order if you write a check or pay cash for your Hannaford cards. I will combine your order with others to reach the \$1,000 Hannaford minimum.

All \$500 reloads still need your card to be emptied. This is the maximum dollar amount Hannaford can reload on any one card. (Members who buy \$1,000 worth, receive two \$500 cards).

If you would like to join the group of members who use the monthly automatic reloads, please contact me. **This is the easiest of all.** We process these reloads on the third Friday of each month and there is no minimum amount.

Thank you for supporting our program. Please buy Hannaford cards as gifts for your family and friends. New designs are now available.

Beginning The Next Chapter...

It is Sunday morning and I am writing to you from Maine Medical Center where I am oncall today and tonight. Since finishing the unit of Clinical Pastoral Education I was enrolled in this spring, I've continued working here, occasional nights and weekends, as a community on-call chaplain. It is challenging and rewarding work and I love being able to do it, even if it's just once or twice a month.

It is hard to believe the summer is already coming to an end. Soon our community will be gathering for the start of the church year, but this year will be different for me: I will not be in Augusta. Instead I will beginning student ministry at the UU Church of Brunswick.

It seems sudden, for something that has been so long in coming. I have one academic class left to complete my M.Div. degree, and four semesters of internship; I am on track to graduate in May 2018, and beginning to prepare for my eventual interview with the Ministerial Fellowship Committee. I still have a long way to go on this journey toward professional ministry. But now the end finally seems a little closer than the beginning.

When I first walked through our doors, that summer Sunday in 2007 when I arrived at 9:15 for a service that was happening at 10:00 and was recruited into the choir by regulars who had also missed the time change memo, I could not have imagined ending up where I am today. The spirit that is holy in the world moves in strange and mysterious ways. Singing in the choir, volunteering for renovation teams and rummage sales led me to serve here as a committee chair and worship associate, which in turn awakened my call to professional ministry: to serve wholeheartedly this thing which is larger than just us, right here and right now.

And so the time has come when you, my church family, are more likely to see me out in the world than within our walls. I may be volunteering for the spiritual care department here at the Augusta hospital, or on-call at Maine Med; showing up for justice at a vigil or rally, a MUUSAN meeting or Wabanaki REACH event; and of course I will be in all my usual places on the internet. Where I will not be, for the most part, is among you in church on Sunday morning.

In our Unitarian Universalist tradition a minister's authority is grounded in the congregation: a congregation calls or contracts with a minister to serve them, and only a congregation has the authority to ordain. But long before that, those who prepare for the ministry begin their journey in relationship with the congregation they call home. It has been a privilege to learn from and belong to the UUCC of Augusta; as I go out into the world, to serve our sister congregation in Brunswick as intern and wherever else I go, I carry you with me. Thank you for everything.
