A NEW YEAR, A NEW LOOK

The beginning of a new church year is always an exciting time for reconnecting with old friends and the familiar activities that have slowed down during the summer. It's a time to welcome new friends and visitors to our congregation and to all that UU Community Church in Augusta has to offer. It's also an opportunity to examine our standard practices and discern how we could be more effective.

The Board and staff have been looking at ways to streamline our communications efforts, and we've looked closely at the labor-intensive monthly newsletter. The Communications Workgroup discussed the newsletter and supported the recommendation that publication would be three times a year and issues would contain content filled articles, rather than calendar items.

To maximize the efforts of our volunteers, the Board of Trustees voted to try this newsletter format this year. Instead of monthly, we will publish a more comprehensive edition in September, January and April, to coincide with the church year. For those few members without electronic communication, pastoral ministers will consider a practice of mailing weekly announcements. A committee of Rev. Carie, Martha Naber and Nancee Campbell was formed to initiate the process with the September edition.

UUCC will continue to utilize several methods of communication:

- The weekly email blast that comes to all the members and friends every Wednesday;
- The information publications available in the foyer and pews about our programming;
- The weekly announcements in the Sunday Order of Service; and
- The comprehensive web site (www.augusta.org) that lists all the activities and events, as well as all the offices and organizations of the congregation.

The new newsletter will feature more in-depth articles on various aspects of our congregational life, as well as innovations occurring in churches elsewhere. We hope this new approach will address the difficulty of securing newsletter volunteers and getting accurate information to everyone in the congregation.

The 'New Newsletter Committee' hopes that everyone in the congregation will take advantage of the variety of communication opportunities we offer. Please talk to any one of the committee members if you have observations or suggestions.

FROM THE DESK OF REV. CARIE

A Faith Journey...

A New Year, A New Look, and a few new practices.

I am excited to be returning to my tenth year of ministry at Unitarian Universalist Community Church. What a wonderful shared ministry we have co-created. Together, in our little corner of the world, we have grown exponentially in our inreach and our outreach. People have come and gone, children have grown up and moved away, still the vibrancy of Life, Love and the Holy lives on in the community that gathers together.

As Monique McAuliffe, Religious Exploration Director and I, sat to plan the upcoming year and review the list of children and youth, we enjoyed reminiscing about the growth of the children in the community. Welcome back to our Religious Exploration Youth Programs and Classroom!

Our first day of class will be on Sunday 9/16.

Nursery Care is available for children 4 years of age and younger are welcome in the Nursery, which is next to the Fellowship Hall. Care is provided by one trained youth and one adult volunteer per service, who will be present each Sunday to share time with our youngest UUs. Nursery care is available at both services, every Sunday. Parents are expected to sign their young children into the nursery. The same parent is expected to sign their child out in keeping with our Safe Congregation policy.

At UUCA we offer a morning RE class during our first service at 9:15 AM. Our youth begin in the sanctuary and head to the classroom at the Drew House following the Wisdom Story in the service. This year we will be basing our interactive classes off of the RE Resources from Soul Matters; What does it mean to be a people of Vision. We will be learning through music, art, games and social service projects. We will be visited on some of our mornings with members of our own community who will be sharing their UU spiritual practices, life skills and journey's that deepen their faith, thus helping to strengthen our youths relationship with their community, home and church.

We will be offering a Coming of Age Program this year for youths ages 12-14 years. We will be meeting every second Sunday, 9:15 - 12:15 in the Drew House downstairs.

Throughout history, communities have welcomed youth on the cusp of adulthood with rituals of recognition, honor and celebration. The Coming of Age Program helps our youth discern for themselves what it means to live a life of faith, individually, and as part of a larger Unitarian Universalist faith community. It involves spiritual learning and enrichment activities, community service, group discussions, bonding games and working with mentors.

Each month our youth will explore a variety of daily spiritual practices as well as work on leadership skills, UU identity and good old fun. The program features a ropes course, a trip to Boston and a year-end service presented by the youth during which they will read their statements of belief(or credos) and be recognized as emerging young adults.

Our Junior and Senior Youth are invited to participate in our Peace Jam Social Justice Group that meets every 1st Sunday, 3:00-5:00 in Fellowship Hall of our Church.

Peace Jam is a social-action leadership program for youth ages 13 to 18. The group meets once each month on a Sunday evening to explore peace work, engage in a service-learning project, and enjoy each other's company. The program includes a Peace Jam Conference in the spring and culminates in a Peace Jam Service for our congregation. The youth involved study a Nobel Peace Prize winner throughout the year whom they will meet at the Peace Jam Conference.

At the UUCU we strive to meet social and spiritual needs of our youth as their faith community. We want our youth to leave the RE program with a very good idea of what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist, a person of a liberal religious faith. We hope they will know the fulfillment and security a faith community holds for each and every individual willing to become part of a connected group of loving people who celebrate life in all its mystery. We also work together to understand the power of faith in action to affect change for good in our world.

The Religious Exploration leaders, teachers and volunteers are supported by our amazing UUCU Community who is here to offer a safe place for our youth to stretch their minds, touch their hearts and nurture their spirits!

It is good to be coming home, and it is also important to name that both I and our congregation have changed in the years I've been away at seminary. As Rev. Carie shared this spring, I've completed my internship and my Master of Divinity degree, and I continue in the UUA's credentialing process. I am scheduled to re-interview with the Ministerial Fellowship Committee this winter, and their decision will determine the timeline for the steps that follow.

In the mean time, I will be participating here, but my role here going forward will be different than it was in the beginning. Three years ago this congregation sponsored me as a candidate for ministry and witnessed the beginning of my collegial relationship with Rev. Carie. Now that I am returning to the congregation she serves, it becomes important that I honor my covenant with her, as a colleague, to support her as settled minister of this congregation. I'm learning to become **a** minister, but Rev. Carie is **our** minister.

My ministry is elsewhere. Since last October I have been serving as a per diem chaplain at Maine Medical Center in Portland, anywhere from one night a month to several nights a week as need demands. It's fulfilling work and I hope to continue this ministry for the foreseeable future. I am exploring the possibility of further credentialing as a board certified professional chaplain, after I complete the UUA's requirements for fellowship and ordination. One credentialing process at a time!

I love you all. I am glad to be home. I am inviting this congregation to join and witness this part of my journey.

During our meeting on August 24th with Rev. Carie, Bruce, Marty and I were able to "meet" Rev. Dafis on Skype. He described some favorite Welsh foods, including Cawl (lamb stew), Welsh rarebit, and the use of leeks in garden salads and quiche. He is going to send some recipes that we may use for the dinner.

Rev. Dafis explained that he plays many instruments, is in a band and is hoping to connect with other musicians while in Augusta. He has offered to teach a Welsh folk dance to a group during our Cultural Evening.

Rev. Carie is preparing a schedule for Rev. Dafis' visit that includes meeting with a Small Group Ministry and also with Seasoned Souls. He will be attending an Elder Luncheon and a Community Supper where he has been asked to offer a prayer before the meal. He will be giving the sermons at our church on September 30th, October 7th and October 14th.

Rev. Dafis has visited our country before but this is his first trip to Maine. He will be with us until October 24th and we all want him to have a pleasant and memorable time. We hope he will get to know many of you and that he will receive invitations to enjoy some of the wonders of our beautiful state.

When asked what he would especially like to do in Maine, he said he is open to everything so here are some things that could be interesting to share with him: lighthouses, beaches, forts, museums, apple orchards, farms, cheese making, ferry rides, universities, libraries, family meals, musical gatherings, films, picnics, alpaca farms, hospitals, coastal villages, wine making, state parks, UU churches, trains, restaurants, boat building, schools - and the list goes on .

New Sanctuary Banner Celebrates 25 Years of Merger

Quilting enthusiasts Nancy Fritz and Martha Naber were approached by Rev. Carie Johnsen early in 2018 and asked about creating a banner to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the merger of the Unitarian and the Universalist congregations in Augusta. They agreed and met with Rev. Carie and Annie Voorhees to discuss ideas and what the Worship Committee wanted to convey with a new banner.

Nancy and Martha asked Nan Bell, an artist and longtime friend of the church, to join them in thinking about a design to depict the journey of the two separate churches and the move to becoming UUC. The similarities and differences of the two historic congregations were listed, the merger process was shared, and ideas of how to represent all this were used to give Nan details to incorporate in her draft and then final sketch of a design.

The work began with finding an approach that would honor the ideas and would work with fabric. Paper patterns were drawn, sample elements made in cloth, many measurements taken, individual fabric stashes were scoured, fabrics ordered arrived, and finally techniques were chosen. Construction began early in August when Nancy and Martha recognized that the large tables and space available in Fellowship Hall would be very helpful to lay out all the supplies while continuing to sew on the individual elements.

Excitement built as the Unitarian and Universalist church circles came alive with fabrics representing music, worship, taking our values into the world, coffee, children, families and youth, diversity, nature, making connections, and even the challenges of difficult times.

The merger took more than a year of many meetings and negotiations about all the aspects of making two congregations into one. The quilters and artist decided to use a braid made of fabric to represent all the work and decisions that were required to form one body from the two previous congregations, decisions which still impact UUC today.

Finally, the flaming chalice was chosen as a symbol of UUC today. It is set on a background of a hand painted multicolored fabric Martha found many years ago at a quilt show.

A more detailed key to the banner will be distributed after it is installed in the sanctuary. Check out the banner and discover what meanings you find. Join Martha on Sunday, Sept 9th at 10:15AM between services to talk about the making and the meaning.

News from your Discernment Team

The Discernment Team of our church began its work on August 27, 2018. The Team will function for 2 or 3 years and in that time will develop and facilitate a process for congregational discernment. The process of the Discernment Team's work develops in engagement with the congregation. There is no imagined outcome except the adaptations for the continued vitality of the UUC of Augusta, Maine well into the 21st century.

The word discernment has evolved from the French "to sift" and from the Greek "to judge." The current definition is to grasp and comprehend the obscure.

The Discernment Team will observe, pose questions, and enter into dialog with intention to listen for the heartbeat of the church; to learn what is essential and what adaptations will bring us vibrantly into the future.

From our observations, dialog, and listening we will prompt the congregation to:

- Sift—examine the elements and underlying assumptions that create church as we know it;
- Judge—weigh the value of each element as the assumptions are exposed;
- And comprehend the obscure—propose the adaptations that will serve us in the future.

Member of the team include: Karen Foust (Chair), Gary Chapin, Debbie Mattson, Annie Nessen Voorhees, Erin Ballew, Catherine Emery and Claire Curole. The Team is reading two books to inspire us: *The Divergent Church: The Bright Promise of Alternative Faith Communities* by Tim Shapiro and *Upcycle Your Congregation: Creative Ideas for Transforming Faith Communities*, edited by Sara Lammert. The church owns several copies of these books if you are interested in reading them, too.
