A Faith Journey by Rev. Carie Johnsen...

Spring is coming. Spring is COMING! Spring IS COMING! SPRING IS COMING!!!

I know, I know, I know, Spring is here? But really, take a look outside.

As I grow older and wiser, there are many things that I once was sure I knew, that I'm not so sure I know anymore; but of this I am sure, SPRING IS COMING. Just as sure as the sunrises each day, we can be sure the sun will return to the northern woods. As the frozen earth and the northern skies struggle to shake off the winter chill, we humans cling to this simple truth, SPRING IS COMING! In the still of our awaiting hours, we greet the morning light and the lengthening days with eager anticipation, and we say, "Welcome, we are glad you're here."

It has been a long cold winter. It has been a long hard winter. With each week it seems it may never end. I look ahead at the forecast and it seems thirties is as good as it gets. I was sure I wouldn't need to call the sand truck again, but then the driveway froze over and my four-wheel drive began sliding up the hill. Ok, one more time, but please, no more plowable snowfalls. And then, I remind myself, oh yeah, I now live in Maine and this could easily be our reality.

Did I say it's been a long hard cold winter? Need we be reminded again, SPRING IS COMING!

When we gather on Sundays in community as a people of faith, I look out upon the friends and members in the pews and I pray for peace and joy, harmony and balance, warmth and relief from heating bills. I pray for the hardship, turmoil and transitions to be carried lightly. I ponder the trials and tribulations of the people I have come to minister to with deep respect and affection. It is a privilege to walk alongside each of you; learning to walk gently and carry it lightly is the challenge.

Five years of shared ministry have brought us deeper into relationship and strengthened our commitment to care for one another. At times, as I hold the joys and sorrows of the collective community in my heart, I am amazed by all we humans are called to be and do.

Just this week, as I sat in a circle bearing witness to the fullness of our lives, I found myself uncertain about how to hold it all, respond to it all and carry it all. Then I was reminded of what it means to be in a faith community with shared ministry as its foundation. There in the circle, as each person cared for another, I was able to bear witness to the grace of people ministering to one another with compassion, understanding, respect and empathy. In a circle of mutuality, our shared experiences find the healing balm of tears and laughter. Gratefully and humbly I am reminded we hold this ministry of caring for each other together. Each of us has the ability to listen deeply to another human being, bear witness to the fullness of another persons story, and partake in the divine act of lighten another persons burden.

May each of us find a way to listen deeply, hold it lightly and walk gently together into the sun.

Leadership for the Future...

Church life is busy from September's In-Gathering Sunday to the June annual meeting, but the pace quickens during the last months of the church year. Our Sunday services increase in variety and depth. We're well into our annual stewardship campaign. And this year, our Milton, Mass. mentor congregation's visit the first weekend in April marks a high point in the ongoing exploration we call Leap of Faith.

But another, quieter process is also taking place. The Leadership Development Committee has begun its work toward creating a slate of candidates for UUCC leadership posts for consideration at the annual meeting. But Leadership Development, the name that recently replaced Nominating, is about a lot more than filling names on a slate, as we've come to realize. Leadership training programs offered by our Northern New England District and the stellar work of our minister, Carie Johnsen, have shown us that keeping lay leadership at a high level is an ongoing, year-round endeavor.

I've had dozens of "leadership conversations" over the past few years, and I can honestly say I've enjoyed them all. Even when a member decided not to take up a leadership opportunity, I've learned something important, and often enough heard, "This isn't right for me now, but maybe it will be later."

That makes a sense. We all have moments in our lives when just keeping our existing commitments is all we can manage. But there are other times when it's good to become more closely involved in church life. We ask a lot of our leaders, but we give them permission to say when they need a change, or simply time off. That's the best way I know to avoid "burnout." It's now unusual to have a committee chair, or a board member, serve more than three years in any position. But keeping leadership fresh and appealing also creates more challenges for the Leadership Development Committee. I'm pleased to report that this important role is again in good hands.

Last year, Leadership Development performed its task so well that all its members had new things to do. Annie Voorhees, the chair, volunteered to become chair of the Music Committee. Lois Whitcomb, who'd served for several years, decided to retire. And Janet Sawyer, a former congregational president, took time from her work as Small Group Ministry Committee chair to lend her experience for that year.

The Board of Trustees has now appointed a new committee that we're sure will maintain high standards. Debbie Mattson, who served as president from 2008-2010 and in other leadership roles, including the Safe Congregation Task Force, will chair. Jeff Janell, former chair of the Long Range Planning Committee, will also join the committee, as will Beth Nasberg, a one-year member who will help us reach out to those who've recently joined UUCC.

In the coming weeks, committee members will be having many leadership conversations, so don't be surprised if you hear from one of them. There are at least two board positions available, and UUCC has 13 standing committees, plus a variety of subcommittees, work groups and task forces. All are important to our community life and, together, represent much of what we hope for and aspire to as one of Maine's leading UU congregations.

There's no obligation, of course. But we hope everyone will consider whether they can help build our community through service. During my own time in office, I've come to realize that nearly every church member is a potential leader.

Student Essay Contests on Atheism and Religious Liberty..

The Freedom from Religion Foundation, a group that pursues separation of church / state violations, is offering high school, college and graduate/older student essay scholarship competitions.

The High School Senior essay asks college-bound high school seniors to write an essay on "A Moment When I Spoke Up for Secularism." The College essay asks college students to write an essay on "My Atheist/Unbeliever 'Coming Out' Story". The Graduate / Older Student essay asks college student aged 25-30 to write an essay on "Why 'Religious Liberty' Does Not Mean the Right to Impose Your Religion on Others".

Winning essays will receive \$3,000 1st place, \$2,000 2nd place, \$1,000 3rd place, \$750 4th place, \$500 5th place and \$400 for 6th place. Several \$200 "honorable mentions" may be awarded.

A monthly withdrawal from your checking account would be transferred to UUCC's Operating Account. The withdrawal occurs on the 2nd Friday of each month.

The advantage for UUCC is that we have regular, known contributions coming in, even if you are away, or too busy to get to church on Sunday morning. The accounting is also streamlined, and you don't need to write checks!
