A Faith Journey by Rev. Carie Johnsen...

Here I sit in the comforts of middle class white America in the middle of a very white state pondering my return to beloved community. I have much to be grateful for - I am well, my children and grandchildren are well. I am employed, paid a living wage and respected in my ministry. I have food to keep me nourished, friends and colleagues to sustain me in my journey and my summer sojourn has offered a time to rest, connection with family and deep spiritual renewal.

Yet all around me, if I chose to listen and bear witness, is a world torn apart, countries with people wounded, afraid, and angry, people retaliating with reciprocal violence, people raising an angry voice, civilians dying by the thousands, nations of people polarized and unable to find peaceful resolution. There is unrest in Missouri and Israel/Palestine and Iraq and Ukraine. Across the globe racial tensions, ethnic tensions and religious tensions mount with greater cost to humanity and our earthly home bears the scars. Our children are terrified, dying in the streets, in the desert and in their homes, bused to detention centers, recruited into gangs and sold into slavery.

It is overwhelming and I fight the impulse to flee, to bury my head in the sand and pretend all is well. I know deep in my soul somewhere behind my jaded heart is a well of tears. My challenge as a minister and a woman who seeks to be fully engaged with all of life is to let myself look into the eyes of evil and scream an angry cry. My personal journey of enculturation has conveniently woven for me a fine veil of apathy should I chose to hide blindly and quietly. Still I cry silent tears, still I speak up to injustice, still I do what I can from my location in a hurting, fighting world.

As I sat to write this month's article, I struggled with my choice: Do I write an article celebrating the loving embrace of a faith community returning from their summer sojourns? Or do I write an article that speaks to the truth of what is unfolding across the globe?

It is the very fact that I have this choice that compelled me to choose the latter. I recognize in all this - my privilege as a white, middle class woman - I live with choice to stand up to the injustice or don the veil. Choice, assumed in my world of privilege, yet not so easily available in a world held up by institutional and systemic racism, sexism, ableism...; not so easily employed in the harsh reality of injustice and inequality, terrorism and war; not so easily engaged and retained in the rhetoric of power, politics and corporation.

It is because we stand in power and choice that we chose to return back to this faith community, year after year, month after month, week after week. It is because we see in our Unitarian Universalist values a way to be true to all that is our life, to lift the veil, confront evil, stand against injustice, speak truth to power <u>and</u> to find comfort in the pews, to sustain the journey in companionship with others, seek inspiration to guide our days and soothe our weary souls.

Our theme for September, *Inclusive Community*, offers us a springboard to deep conversation and reflection on what our faith asks of us. We begin our month with our annual water communion, then explore the rich theme by asking the questions, 'to whom do we belong?' In a world gone mad, in a world where love reaches out, how shall we be relevant in a way that draws our circle of inclusion ever wider every day?
