A Faith Journey by Rev. Carie Johnsen...

You may recall these words from the Harvest Communion:

Love whole heartedly, be surprised, give thanks and praise -- then you will discover the fullness of life. Within this human impulse to gratitude flow the vast cycles of universal reciprocity-- for everything that is taken, something has to be given in return... Life is not giving or taking but give and take. This is the dynamic expression of universal belonging ...

As I drove down the road to be with family and friends for the holiday weekend, I found myself pondering a more expansive meaning of this notion of universal reciprocity. Thanks in part to the abundance of holiday music on the radio, I also began a conscious shift to the season of love and joy, carols and lights. Still feeling the ripple of Sunday's service, this season of gift giving began to expand and grow in meaning.

As I drove through Maine, I reflected about the give and take of my ministry. Contemplating the journey of belonging as a product of reciprocity, I became so very aware of how much I receive from all of you visa vie my giving. For example:

The Goddess Continuing group had the first group Croning Ceremony. In the company of family and friends 6 crones mentored 9 women being croned. Born of the perspective that only time and conscious aging brings, crones claim their power and celebrate their unique gift. In the act of croning women recognize their transition to a new place in the cycle of life as wise elder, sage, teacher, guide and healer. I attended this ceremony and as the Minister in the circle of 16 women, I offered the welcome and witnessed to their personal reflections on the meaning of this transition. I had the honor of blessing the crones. I have always understood the importance of ritual and rites of passage in our lives, this act of marking milestones and transitions. Yet, there in the company of 15 crones claiming the wisdom of their years, I understood the ritual of croning on a heart level. My soul experienced the validity of claiming the wisdom years. As I approach my fiftieth birthday, the years in front of me look very different today because of the courage of these women to celebrate aging, to say yes!

This month we enter our third holiday season together. One of my favorite times in our faith community is December: the music service, the pageant, the holiday vespers service and Christmas Eve service. Every year I have the privilege of mining the season for deep meaning and purpose. I am expected to go beneath the surface of commercialism, unplugging the holiday frenzy and coming up with relevant and inspiring ways to be connected beyond the next best gift. As I give, each year I grow deeper in my connection to each of you and in my sense of belonging as Minister of UUCC. As I give, I heal the years when my own holidays were filled with sorrow, grief and loss.

Universal reciprocity is not about what comes wrapped in a bow. It is about what comes authentically from the heart of you and me. It is the simple acts that let people know we see them, we value them, we care for them, we honor them. It is the give-take of being in genuine relationship with humanity, the creatures of the earth and the universe to which we belong. The take is a poignant sense of belonging and knowing our interdependence.

I am very aware my life is blessed by the give-take of a strong congregation committed to each other. May you too find the joy of knowing, really knowing, we are more in our shared ministry than any of us could be alone.

And when the new year's sunshine blazed awake They shouted, reveling.

Through all the frosty ages you can hear them Echoing behind us – listen! All the long echoes, sing the same delight, This Shortest Day.

This year and every year.

History in the Making

The weekend before Election Day, I got a call from Carie Johnsen. Overnight, the Pittsfield UU church had seen its gay pride banner torn down, and all of its "Yes on 1" signs removed – and replaced by 14 "No on 1" signs. This theft and vandalism deeply disturbed the congregation, but – as their minister, Margaret Beckham, said in her sermon that Sunday morning – "When the going gets tough, UUs call their friends."

After talking with Carie, we decided to send a delegation to Pittsfield. Joining me were several members of UUCC's social justice groups – Jenny McKendry, Stephanie Ralph and Dale McCormick. The service and the vigil outside the church, which is located right in the center of town, were inspiring. The congregation not only repaid an act of hate with acts of love, but it was joined by representatives from 10 other UU congregations from around the state. Rep. Stacy Fitts, a Republican who represents Pittsfield and became a leader in the "Yes on 1" campaign for marriage equality, spoke to more than 60 UUs gathered outside the church, as did Shenna Bellows, executive director of ACLU-Maine. We were all proud to be there that day.

And of course, that Tuesday, Maine made history by becoming the first state to legislate, by voter referendum, the right to marriage for all adults.

The following Saturday, many of the same UUs were back at work for another historic occasion. Some 32 representatives from 11 congregations gathered at UUCC for the first meeting of the Maine UU Social Action Network. We learned from Nancy Banks, recently retired from the UUA office, that there are more than a dozen state networks already, with more being formed. While all are unique, most of them have as a goal representing Unitarian Universalist principles in their state capital – which is why UUCC will have an important role in this organization. Nine of our members attended, and more have pledged to become involved. Dale McCormick will represent UUCC on the steering committee.

For the first year, MUUSAN chose, through a series of votes, three areas to concentrate its efforts – global warming and climate change, health care and Medicaid, and revitalizing democracy. A working group was formed for each subject, and will be recommending action steps over the coming months. More members are welcome, and the next MUUSAN meeting will be at UUCC on Jan. 12.

At our church, we have always believed in putting our principles to work in the community, from the neighborhood around our doors to the world at large. Over the past few months, we have taken important steps to reaffirm that commitment – while also seeing the results of a campaign that took place over many years to bring justice to loving couples throughout Maine. It's amazing what can happen when we call our UU friends.

Faith in Action...

You are invited to join a Faith in Action meeting on Tuesday January 15th at 6:30.We will discuss and make plans of our own in connection with the issues raised at the newly formed Maine UU Social Action network. The network which held it's first statewide meeting on Nov 10th at UUCC, will hold it's second organizational meeting on Saturday, January 12, 10:00-1:00 at our church. The 11/10 meeting fleshed out the basic structure of a state wide UU social action network. Three important issues were voted on,

to address- Healthcare/ Medicaid, global climate change and revitalizing democracy.

Augusta Food Bank. \$14,000 was raised by the auction which the food bank held recently; \$3,000 more than last year!!! UU's contributed to that total. Food bank donations-you might buy a prepared bag at Shaw's or donate your own through church. The Augusta Food Bank always needs non-perishables. The Essentials Pantry (at St. Mark's Episcopal) needs diapers, especially larger sizes 4,5 and adult. They can use toiletries, women's sanitary products and laundry soap.

Please think of clothing for teens when you clean out in the next month. I have some teen clothing that didn't go to NY for hurricane Sandy relief, so I'll re-route it. This request for clothing has come in from George of Kennebec Behavioral Health. A box will be placed in the coat room labeled : Teen clothing- for Halcyon House

Thank you for doing all that you do for everyone in central Maine! Some of you have received a letter appeal from me in behalf of the youth who are sheltered at Halcyon House - for food, school supplies, soap, shampoo and "contemporary teen clothing." We appreciate those of you who have been able to step forward to help. Thank you! The kids have scarves now, and the Margaret Chase Smith Library in Skowhegan is conducting a canned food drive at that library during the month of December. Everything helps! Immigration Work Group Sets New Goals

UUA General Assembly 2012 in Arizona created lots of positive energy around the issue of immigration and demonstrated the power of working with local groups to meet common goals. President Obama talked about immigration reform in his acceptance speech. The UUCC Immigration Work Group seeks energy and inspiration to guide our work in the local area. We want to offer a time and place where those interested in immigration are comfortable sharing, learning, studying, and taking action. The group meets monthly and would welcome new members.

At its November meeting our Immigration Work Group brainstormed goals for the year. They include an immigration month at UUCC in April with several special events such as an international dinner before the auction, a book discussion, and an evening with speakers invited to tell their immigration stories. We will lead a service and create a display for the display case.

Other ideas are:

Make an award to a second farm, Continue the summer farm worker welcome (farm worker attendance grew from 3 to 13 in one year), Invite a speaker to some meetings, Reach out to people in detention, Make connections with people in the local muslim community, Hold an event with Centro Latino from Portland, Collect items for Maine Migrant Health Program, and Offer Creole classes.

We could use the help of a few other interested people to join us monthly or help with specific activities in order to accomplish goals on this ambitious list.
