The Worship Conversation



So who among you is asking, “What is Carie doing with (or going to do with) the worship service?” This is, by my accounting, a reasonable and curious question; certainly, a logical question of which I will begin to answer. But first a note of caution: if you are looking for a definitive answer, keep looking. After all, don’t we Unitarian Universalists espouse an affinity for ongoing and evolving revelation? This theology applies also to how we gather in worship together.

As I began my ministry with all of you, I sought to better understand the common elements of worship and the familiar order of worship at UUC. Here is what I heard from members who shared their experiences: there is no longer a standard practice for worship. I learned there are common elements, favorite rituals, much loved music and musicians as well as an affinity for witnessing shared experiences, but there is no longer one set order of worship that must be followed from week to week.

Ah hah, I said, there is room for creativity and spirit to enter and guide the worship service. I find this is an exciting way to enter ministry.

To this end, as I create a worship service, I work to identify a theme or message and then I add liturgical elements; rituals, music and homilies around the message. I ask myself what practices will serve to create a transformative worship experience around the intended message. Sometimes the message lends itself to an enriched and altered worship space. The Harvest Communion is an example: we moved the pulpit, brought in some props and some chairs, listened to stories shared by our elders, broke bread together and poured the cider. The choral response filled the space and our hymns added movement. The typical period of welcome, announcements and embracing meditation would have seriously altered the flow of the worship, so we chose to leave those elements out.

My goal is to keep enough of the common elements and order in the service, most Sundays, so we have the familiar to ground us; giving us our roots. At the same time, I like to venture away from the comfortable, inviting us to stretch with open heart and open mind: giving us wings.

As I said earlier, this is an ongoing, evolving process. As always, let me know what works for you and what doesn’t. This is a conversation; and you are welcome to enter into the dialogue.

From the Director of Religious Exploration

Let religion be a voice of renewing challenge to the best we have and may be; let it be a call to generous action. (Vincent B. Silliman, SLT 466)

Generous action abounds at the UUCC. At this time of thanksgiving, I find myself yet again grateful for being a part of this beloved, generous, activist community.

When I sat down among the No on 1 canvassers, I was very proud of the fact that my minister was sitting among the workers there, and so were many congregation members, and my very own daughter. And the person leading the training was also a fellow congregant. I loved seeing members of our congregation putting their faith into action; I loved witnessing their affirmation of equality for all.

Recently I traveled together with youth from our Peace Jammers, adult advisors, and Carie, on a fact-finding mission to the Unitarian Universalist Urban Ministries in Boston and to the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee to see what we could do to aid the social justice movement, and thereby help ourselves better understand the world. I was once again impressed by the work of Unitarian Universalists. At the Urban Ministries, donations of time and money from UU congregations sustain the outreach to urban children and youth, encouraging them to finish high school and attend college, supporting their education both socially and academically. And at the UUSC, we witnessed partnering for change that is both respectful of the people who are being helped, and mindful of the reciprocal help the helpers receive. Our youth were both impressed and filled with ideas. More on this as our work develops ...

And our beautiful One Hen collected enough quarters to fund not one but two entrepreneurs through the Kiva foundation, which provides micro-finance loans to people who hope to build a sustainable business in areas of poverty. Our children and youth engaged in a questioning session and council circle that resulted in supporting two businesses. The first person they chose to support because she was on her own and they wanted her to succeed. The second they supported because a bakery is a great place for people to gather in community—and besides, bakery stuff is yummy! They chose unanimously not to support a person making cigars, for fear of luring anyone into an unhealthy activity. I was impressed with the reasoning and the compassion expressed in the circle of our children.

And is there a day that goes by that I am not grateful for the continued good will, flexibility, and awesome energy of the religious exploration volunteers? No! I witness such wonderful best selves, such amazing connections with and among the children and youth, such inspiring commitment to community.

And, so, as I enter into the season of thanksgiving and celebrations of generosity, I am once again and always sustained by this community. Thank you all.

SMALL GROUP MINISTRY



Here is a guided meditation to help you manage holiday stress:

Close your eyes and relax. Imagine that you are seated in a comfortable chair surrounded by seven to nine friendly faces. One person is speaking and the others are paying close attention. As the speaker quiets, there is a restful pause and then another begins to respond in a thoughtful manner. You find yourself realizing that these people are very much like you and yet their words help you discover thoughts and beliefs you had not realized were yours. Time passes as you share insights and laughter with one another. As the scene draws to a close, you all acknowledge that you will be meeting again in the near future.

When you are ready, turn your attention back to the newsletter. Notice that you feel calmer, satisfied and eager for the next meeting of this group.

As many of you know, this experience is real for many members of our congregation. Small Group Ministry is very much like this. We are currently in the process of beginning NEW GROUPS. I hope to have two groups starting in January. Dates and times will be announced after I have spoken with everyone who has expressed an interest. I will do my best to accommodate your availability and schedule. There are possibilities for groups in the evening or during the day and for meeting either once or twice a month. I encourage anyone who is thinking about Small Group Ministry to let me know in the next couple of weeks so I can include you in the planning.

Welcoming Congregation: Marriage Equality

Maggie Ricker, was a major organizer in Augusta area for the Marriage Equality campaign, offers the following summary of the work the Augusta UCC for the UUA district Welcoming Congregation e-list. This shows the ability of the congregation to participate over a period of time. **Thank you. Maggie, for taking this leadership.**

- From February on, we held weekly phone banks at the Church in our Fellowship Hall. Some people worked the phones; some people brought food.
- Also, back in those very early days of the campaign, we had two services specifically focused on the issues faced by the LGBT community. Keith Kron from UUA delivered one of the sermons.
- Many of us attended the public hearing in April wearing bright red and contributed to that 'oh my goodness' feeling one got when they walked into that huge civic center and saw a sea of red everywhere!
- In August, we had a very successful baked bean dinner. We went through 40 pounds of hotdogs and 7 huge crock pots of beans and more desserts than you can imagine. The dinner was followed by a fabulous talent show. (We seriously know how to eat, act, sing and play!)
- On Oct 25th we had one of the most rousing services I've ever attended – “Standing on the Side of Love!” It was standing room only, we had crafted some creative methods of presenting our views. We also served wedding cake at Fellowship hour. We were fortunate that the press was in attendance and we got a front page article that completely captured the essence of the service.
- The Sunday before the vote, we held a candle light Vigil outside the church. It was very surprisingly well attended by lay people from the church and from the community as well as 5 clergy. (The *Kennebec Journal* indicated that 75 people were in attendance). Although the write up didn't equal the job the first one did, it did still get the message out that there were people of faith who believed in civil marriage for gays and lesbians.
- The last week of the campaign, the No on One campaign put forth a mega door to door canvassing event, staged from a very large empty office building. Many, many of our members worked there; dropped off a ton of wonderful home made food, made endless phone calls and walked miles and miles of door to door canvassing. The Governor came in Tuesday morning to personally thank us and shook everyone's hands.
- On Wednesday night after the vote, we held a service of grieving and healing. We were heart broken and Rev. Carie Johnsen gave us the opportunity to grieve out loud together, to speak of our pain, anger and fear. We cried together; we raged together; we held up our love and respect for each other and for the work we had done together. When we left the church the overwhelming pain and anger had been lifted enough for us to make it through the next few days without 'losing it' – and with a renewed commitment.

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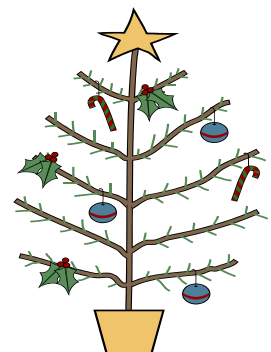
