A Faith Journey...

Already one third of our first year together is but a memory. A delightful one. A busy one. A holy one.

And now the calendar year is about to flip, once again, forward, to 2010. Amazing! I remember just yesterday worrying about the predicted millennium catastrophes.

As we enter into January 2010, we also enter deeper into this first year of building relationships and getting to know one another. In this newsletter you will see two very specific ways for us to enter more fully into the act of seeing each other and being seen. Not just in superficial ways but in meaningful ways that matter to our everyday ordinary lives. What makes this a faith journey? To this end, I bring an invitation to each of you to attend two events.

As you can see from the worship calendar, on the first Sunday of 2010 I have planned to carry forward a tradition I was taught by my mentor. Many Ministers have a practice of lifting up questions of faith that have been lingering about during the year. The ways of engaging this practice are many and varied. Typically members of the congregation bring questions to the minister. I would like to bring some faith questions to all of you as well. I currently have a list of two; more may emerge between now and then. But certainly, two will suffice.

The second event is the adult religious exploration course being offered this winter – Building Your Own Theology. I want to know what matters most to all of you. What are your ultimate concerns and convictions? I invite you to enter into dialogue about ultimate meanings and values. This is a dialogue that is both personal and interpersonal. Alone we experience the world around us. Together we theologize—bringing the intellectual process of analyzing, clarifying, articulating, and symbolizing those values, meanings, and convictions that grow of our experience.

Together we share the journey of understanding our experiences, naming and claiming our evolving ideas and beliefs to the end that we learn and grow religiously. In a community of meaning makers and co-creators, we engage in the task of being, belonging and becoming.

Both of these events encourage deeper knowing of ourselves and each other—this task of creating intimacy and ultimacy. With deeper knowing, may we, together, harness our deepest explosions and bring them boldly into our future.

Please join me. I look forward to getting to know you.

Building Your Own Theology with Rev. Carie Johnsen Wednesdays, 6:00 – 8:00 p.m. ~ January 27th, February 10th & 24th, March 10th & 24th , April 7th

We are meaning makers. We are co-creators. We live in a community of meaning makers and co-creators.

Based on the assumption that everyone is their own theologian, this classic Unitarian Universalist adult religious exploration program invites participants to develop their own personal credos. Together we will explore ultimate meanings – our deepest values and convictions. We will build theologies based on the materials from your individual life experiences.

Participants are encouraged to make a commitment to attend all six sessions. Short readings and reflections will be given for the off weeks. At the end, participants will be invited to share their credos with the congregation at a service in May. This is optional.

I just finished a course from Starr King School of Theology on Organizational Systems Thinking for Religious Leaders. What a valuable and enlightening experience I had, one I hope will be reflected as I serve this congregation and try to put what I learned to good use. I've attached my final project.

The Welcome Table



I made the sketch for this painting within the first few weeks of class. Although my understanding of organizational systems thinking has expanded and improved, and my perception of "-isms" has deepened and become more discerning, I embrace my original image with the naive and ever-hopeful notion that beloved community may be as simple as reaching out a supportive and needful hand—especially if the reach is reciprocal---equal, mutual, and balanced.

I tried to depict this support in the people of all races who both embody our chalice and create the structure of our faith community, the vessel of our faith.

The flame is always both the spirit of the group and the mystery, which is both collective and individualistic. The flame holds power and beauty and is available to all who seek it.

The seven promises of our faith surround the vessel, dancing with the people, dancing with their ideas, ideals, visions, and dreams. The six sources provide a steady foundation, a floor for stomping, for gliding, for leaping, and for landing. Surrounding the symbols are words of welcome, words of faith, words of hope.

And further surrounding and churning, even as the dancers support and are supported by each other, are system cycles. This outer edge is rife with pitfalls, false impressions, mental models, isms, doubt. It is also replete with successes, good instincts, reality checks, equitable relations, and hope.

As 2009 ends and 2010 unfurls, I give thanks yet again for this faith community, the UUCC, with all its system--and with all its willingness to teach and to learn, to adapt and to evolve, and, most important, to reach out with support and with an invitation to a fair, equitable, beloved community.

President's Column.....

Last Spring the Board of Trustees scheduled two town meetings specifically to discuss the church budget; at the time, our projected income was lower than our projected expenses. At these meetings the same question came up several times: "What has happened to our rental income? Why aren't we making more money renting especially since the renovations?"

As a result, the Board studied both the use of our three buildings and the imperative to maintain the safety and integrity of our buildings. It has been a three-part process.

1. We have added a web-based rental process. The rental calendar is linked to our website and rental requests can be made via email to Julie, our administrator. The calendar can be consulted prior to planning the event. This process makes information more accessible and streamlines the rental process. In addition, Julie is available on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Fridays to help reserve space.

2. We have changed the locks on all of our buildings and implemented a process for requesting a key. We did not know who had keys and how many keys were out in the community. To remedy this, we have changed the locks and have a limited number of keys. Church members and regular rental customers received keys after filling out an application reviewed by 2 Board members and Julie.

3. The Board has updated a rental policy and rental fees for the Church and the Annex. The new policy is posted on the Board bulletin board in the Fellowship Hall. Use of 71 Winthrop Street is restricted to church activities.

We are hoping these changes will provide greater safety and an increase in rental income. We also hope that our church is busy with activity—both church and community events. The busier it becomes the more mindful we need to be of those using the space after us. We need to leave the rooms as we found them. We need to communicate all of our scheduling needs; if our needs change we need to negotiate the change through Julie as there may be someone expecting to use the same space either for an event, repair, or cleaning.

All of this is good. It is a sign of the times. We are becoming a more and more vibrant community meeting a diversity of needs. And for this, I am grateful to all of you.
