From the Director of Religious Exploration

As I was preparing for the last Young UU Worship of the year, greeting children and youth as they arrived, I mentioned to one young person how I was a little nervous because I was trying two things that morning that I was unsure would work.

“Don’t worry,” she said, “We’re Unitarian Universalists.”

“What do you mean?” I asked, because my intention was to offer stories that help us define what it means to be Unitarian Universalist.

“We’ll love you no matter what, and besides, it will all work out in the end.”

What do you know! She knew exactly what my message was before I even began! In Young UU Worship a few minutes later, I suggested that many Unitarian Universalists were optimists, filled with hope, filled with the belief that all will be good if it isn’t already. And that most UUs are also pragmatists: they know you need to work toward your goal. I told two stories. One from a collection of Chinese stories called *Harmony* by Sarah Conover and Chen Hui. “Quenching Thirst by Hoping for Plums” tells of a general who motivates his tired, thirsty men by describing a plum forest just over the horizon. The second is the Aesop’s fable “The Crow and the Pitcher,” about a clever, resourceful crow who does not give up when it finds the water too far to reach, but uses pebbles to bring the water level high enough to drink. (That was one of the experiments I was not sure would work, despite my understanding of water displacement.)

I asked the kids to offer morals to the Aesop’s fable. They offered, “Never give up.” “You have to work for your goal.” “Try and you will succeed.” Great offerings! The one Aesop had chosen was “Where there is a will, there is a way.”

Our children and youth are learning what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist, they are living being Unitarian Universalists.

That morning also our world bank was full, so it was time to hold a circle council to decide where to give the money. Young people spoke up to suggest—with reasons why—where the money would go. The suggestions were awesome: The Goodwill, because you can get quality clothes for a good price and the money goes to help others in need; the Human Society, because it works to protect animals and people; the Smile Train, because it helps fix cleft palates; Peta and the ASPCA (founded by Unitarian Henry Bergh) because they work to prevent cruelty to animals; environmental cleanup of the oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico. What won the morning though began with a plea from one of our youngest children: “I want to help feed hungry people.” Another young person said she too wanted to feed hungry people. Then another said, “I want to help the people in Haiti.” Then another said, “We could help hungry and homeless people by giving money to Haiti.” Another chimed in, “We could give that money to the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee.”

After some debate about how to vote (they really are UUs!), we voted overwhelmingly to help Haiti with all our money. I was so impressed by their respectful listening, their clarifying of points, their decision to consolidate the wish to help hungry and homeless with the needs of Haiti, and their desire to do this help through the UUSC. Wow.

Our final celebration of RE for the year is a service presented by the children and youth of our church. I hope all of our congregation comes to experience this worship. We will also recognize the milestones of our program: children stepping up into the youth program, junior youth crossing over to the senior youth program, and senior youth bridging into young adulthood. It is a moving set of rituals that speaks to how quickly life flows forward.



INDEPENDENT FILM SERIES: CHANGE OF DATE



GODDESS CONTINUING

Join us for two Celebrations over the summer.

June 20 Summer Solstice, following the morning service, in the Fellowship Hall. This is when the sun exerts its maximum power upon our part of the earth as its rays strikes us head-on. The time of full outward physical manifestation is here. The solstice was the ancient time of celebration, of outward joy in the fullness of life. The high point of energy is only for a moment. The cycle is moving, and the days gradually shorten. Share things that are part of your summer, consider the spirituality of summer, explore the Sun Goddesses.

August 1 Teltane or Lammas is a recognition that the light and darkness is moving toward a balance, with the hope that the sun will retain its power until the harvest is complete. The luminaries that are part of this celebration coax the sun to stay strong. *You are invited to a summer pot luck picnic after the morning service, and a celebration that will include luminaries.*

SACRED DANCE @ UUCC

Dance is a language of personal expression and creates community when done with conscious intention. "Sacred Dance" is a means of spiritual expression and growth, integrates the mind, the body and the spirit, provides a sense of connection to the Divine, and can be a form of prayer. The body, as it dances, expresses the soul in a way that words cannot.

Sacred Dance is becoming a part of the fabric of worship here at UUCC. We have danced in celebration of Spring and renewal. in commemoration of the "dance" between minister and congregation, in times of darkness and wonder, and as a way to join together in the spirit of worship as a community. As I talk with church leadership, members and friends, there is a shared vision for expanding our exploration of how dance can be a vehicle for our spiritual experience.

I would like to share my vision with you and to hear what your vision is!

I envision two core groups of sacred dancers gathering @ UUCC. One group composed of UU kids, exploring their faith through creative movement and creating their own dances to express and to share their experience. This group may meet during Spirit Play @ our 11:00 service. The second group will be composed of youth and adults, also meeting regularly to explore their spiritual experience through movement and to create dances to share in worship. The exact schedule is yet to be determined. I hope that each group would have participants who share a commitment to regular attendance, but would also be open to the ebb and flow of participation from those who might come and go, as the need &/or call arises.

I envision dancers collaborating with individual musicians and with the choir; creating dance to accompany music; creating music to accompany the dance; weaving music and dance together to create worship!

Sacred Dance is open to all who are interested in exploring their spiritual nature through the medium of movement. No need for formal dance training is necessary.
