A Faith Journey by Rev. Carie Johnsen...

For over two and half years now we have engaged in a model of contemporary worship where the more traditional elements of worship intermingle with modern practices to offer relevant, meaningful, purposeful and engaging worship to the congregation 52 weeks a year.

During this time the Worship Arts Team—pianists, worship associates, sacred dance coordinator, director of religious exploration, choir director and minister—has worked collaboratively to offer traditional services where the sermon is the center and contemporary services where a message is woven together through various liturgical elements – music, dance, word, ritual.

Stepping outside the box of a three hymn sandwich can be unsettling for the congregation at the same time it can bring a new energy and vitality. Equally it can be anxiety provoking for many. It has been a creative joy to engage in a spiritual pilgrimage to offer theme based worship in this talented and open community.

I have appreciated the congregation's willingness to adventure and experiment with a variety of worship elements including ritual, sacred dance, guest reflections, visual arts, multigenerational worship and music. I have been incredibly grateful for the committed and talented pianists, worship leaders and associates who have entered the process with curiosity and creativity, fully ready to explore the possibilities that emerge from the theme. I also recognize the choir's journey toward music that serves to deepen the worship experience has been both a welcomed experiment and an uncomfortable stretch for both the members of the choir and the congregation.

And now it is time to pause and hear from all of you.

I have asked the worship arts team to lead a process of appreciative inquiry to discern what elements of this new style of worship are working well for the community. What about Sunday morning worship inspires, comforts, and transforms? How are you changed by Sunday morning worship? What parts of worship do you talk about with your children or others on the ride home or during the week? What elements of the service touch or speak to you most: sermons, reflections, dance, visual arts, multimedia, music, poetry, music? What about Sunday morning worship stimulates you spiritually, intellectually, and emotionally? Does worship at UUCC give your life meaning, purpose and direction? What would you like to encourage more of?

The Worship Arts Team will lead three focus groups where groups of eight people will meet for an hour and a half to share their thoughts. The intention is to have the groups be representative of the larger congregation, thus once the team has a list of people willing to participate they will select a well-rounded group that represents the congregation. The intention is to have new and long standing members/friends, active and not so active members/friends, children and youth, adult and wise elders, gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, queer and straight, all genders, etc.

Dear Friends.

I love this time of year, don't you? It's still winter so skiing, snowshoeing and sledding are still part of the fun, but the days are longer and the sun seems just a bit warmer, teasing us to think "spring". This portion of the year is also a very important part of our church year, "The Stewardship Campaign". If you've been too immersed in "Downton Abbey" or Jeremy Lin these days to know what the Stewardship Campaign is, let me quickly refresh your memory. Each year our congregation is called upon to support the Unitarian Universalist Community Church with a financial pledge of support. As you know, supporting the church is a requirement of membership. And historically members and friends of the UUCC have been generous. Our average pledge is over \$1,200. Administrator will be able to provide greater support to our UUCC Board, committees, and congregation. We will be able to expand our business hours as well as increase the rental opportunities in our beautifully renovated buildings.

Whether your family participates in Religious Exploration, Small Group Ministry, Sang'ha, the choir, outreach programs, pastoral counseling, or simply attends Sunday services, we all share the blessings of this church, so please pledge. We count on your support to "Live Our Greatness"!

Croning Ceremony ~ You are invited to the Croning Ceremony for Maggie Ricker. This ritual celebrating Maggie as a Woman of Wisdom will be held on **March 4th**, **12:30 -1:30 pm** in the Fellowship Hall. All are welcome.

Women celebrate the phases of their lives, the early years of the Maiden, the reproductive and nurturing years of the Mother, and the wisdom years of the Crone or Wise Woman. People of all ages and genders are invited to participate in this ritual of croning. Several women in the congregation have been croned in ceremonies involving other women. This is the first croning open to the congregation. We look forward to others, and to similar ceremonies for rites of passage for men.

This is a very special occasion for Maggie.

After 45 years of parenting, either first hand with my own children, or second hand with my grandchildren, all of whom I love more than life itself, it's time to look at what I, alone, want. Time to redefine who I am, what I stand for, what path I want to take.

On a very deep, personal level, it signals I've reached the final stage of my life on earth. There is a certain peace that comes with that, surprisingly. It allows me to prepare, at a deeper level of recognition, the types of things I might encounter.

It also is a message to my family that it's time to keep in mind Mom/Gigi, isn't a spring chicken anymore and certain events that happen to me, will undoubtedly make an impact on their lives. It's a wake up call but in a very positive way.

It feels so right to acknowledge and embrace whatever the future might bring, with the full knowledge that it won't all be fun."

It's saying, once again, "OK world, bring it on. I'm ready!"
