A Faith Journey by Rev. Carie Johnsen...

On Saturday, October 15th, I joined the growing Occupy Augusta movement at the bottom of the State House stairs to engage in the democratic tradition of bringing the voice of the people (in this case the 99%) to the elected leaders. This growing, nationwide movement fully aligns with our fifth principle the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large.

On Monday, I joined over 1500 UU's in signing the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee open Letter of Support for the Occupy Movement.

I stand with people around the country and the world who are calling for economic justice.

My values affirm that each person has inherent worth and dignity; that justice, equity, and compassion should be the guiding principles for human relationships; and that all people deserve access to the democratic process.

My recognition of the inherent worth of every person compels me to speak out against policies that privilege the demands of corporations over the human rights of people. I support the Occupy movement in its affirmation that protecting workers' rights and ensuring that basic human needs are met must take precedence. All people have a fundamental right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of themselves and their families.

I also join the Occupy movement in decrying the wealth disparity that leaves millions struggling for economic security. Policies and legislation that promote economic marginalization are morally unacceptable. Everyone is entitled to a government that recognizes and promotes basic economic rights. Justice, equity, and compassion should be foremost in our government's decision making.

Economic oppression is not only a violation of fundamental human rights, it is also a blow to democracy. When economic power is concentrated in the hands of a few and when corporations are awarded the same status as actual human beings, the democratic process is fundamentally compromised. Basic fairness requires that all people have equal opportunity to participate in political debate and to be represented in government.

I envision a powerful and radically inclusive movement for economic justice. I recognize economic justice as a right that is due to all people, regardless of race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, language, religion, political or other opinion, immigration status, national or social origin, property, birth, or other status or distinction.

I sign this letter as an expression of gratitude to all who are working for economic justice in the United States and around the world, as an affirmation of my hope for fair and compassionate economic reforms, and as a renewal of my commitment to help make it so.

Happy Fall, everyone!

Driving to Augusta from Lewiston is a pleasure this time of year. While the trees haven't been quite as spectacular as some years I am reminded that every year is unique unto itself and therefore beautiful in its own way.

Don't forget that Sat. Nov. 5 is when we "fall back" and reset our clocks. If you forget, you'll be an hour early for church on Sunday! Don't miss out on that extra hour of sleep.

The RE Committee meets Nov. 6 at 12:30 upstairs at #71 Winthrop.

A reminder while the weather is still nice that during fellowship hour from 10:30 when RE classes end until 11:00 many of the children enjoy playing outside either in the play space behind 71 Winthrop or in the "climbing tree" in front of the Winthrop St. door. We urge you to keep our children safe by keeping track of their whereabouts and activities during this time. Other options are the "game room" beside the coat room, where board games and cards are available, and the low round table at the far end of Fellowship Hall. Parents are responsible for their children during fellowship time.

In our second service, Spirit Play, we have been reading and responding to books (usually picture books) with a message. The Big Orange Splot by Daniel Pinkwater, and The Little Band by James Sage were our first two. One speaks to the value of making your dreams real, celebrating diversity, and standing up for your vision, while the other reminds us that beauty sometimes comes unexpectedly into our lives and we are never the same again. Although the books chosen are usually children's picture books, the messages are universal and for all ages from 5 to 105. On first and third Sundays, Christine Little offers movement and music as an additional option for responding to the story.

<u>For new folks</u> - Most Sundays Religious Exploration begins in Fellowship Hall at 9:15 with Young UU worship; parents are always welcome! Classes follow. Once a month we begin in the sanctuary for Faith in Action before going to our classes. If you are coming to the 11:00 service, we start out in the sanctuary and then depart for Spirit Play (ages 5 and up). Children are always welcome to bring a friend to either of our RE sessions. Be sure to fill out a registration form and get a copy of our RE prospectus, too. There are some in the entry to the annex and in the Chalice Children room.

Movie Nights for Junior and Senior High are back! The rule of thumb is that they'll usually be on the fourth Sunday of the month from 5:30 to 8:00 p.m. with pizza and discussion. (Makes me almost wish I was a teenager again!) The October discussion topic was "the choices we make".

Do take time / make time to stop and savor the beauty of this amazing time of year. Walk in the leaves with a child. Sit in the sun and smell the unmistakable aroma of Autumn. Pick up a leaf and marvel at its uniqueness and beauty, and then remember that *you* are unique and beautiful, too!

Small Group Ministry ...

In my last column I said that Small Group Ministry is a unique aspect of church life. It is. Small Group Ministry is comprised of intentional, lay led groups meeting regularly to deepen and expand connection in our congregation. We speak of the promises of Small Group Ministry. They are Intimacy, Ultimacy and Growth.

Intimacy is the increasing depth of relationship fostered by the groups. It comes from meeting over a significant length of time, through the practice of listening without comment or advice to what others say and to share deeply from your own experience in a setting where you will be heard without judgment or challenge. The purpose of the group is sharing and learning from one another, not debate or discussion. This process results in your knowing both yourself and others better.

Ultimacy refers to the focus of the group discussion on matters of meaning and significance rather than information. What is important is what members of the group think about the big questions of life, not what a philosopher or theologian has said. What matters is the support members of the group give one another as you encounter life experiences. You can talk about them as you come to understand what these events mean to you individually and how you will grow from them. You will change and you will share in the changes of others.

Growth refers both to an internal process and an external one. Reflection will help you clarify your values so you will grow your soul. Listening will help you grow in your understanding of others. Offering support to others will provide the opportunity for you to grow in generosity. As group members grow in generosity it becomes easier to welcome the stranger to the church from the impulse to be generous with the gifts which have been given to you. Over time, the church will grow in many ways from the presence of Small Group Ministry. Certainly it will be easier to assimilate new members, leading to numerical growth. As members grow individually in generosity, the church will find it easier to reach beyond our walls and become more generous with the community and wider world. And will all of this will come a greater sense of well being.

UUCC has become the embodiment of these promises over the years that we have practiced Small Group Ministry. I invite you to consider joining in this wonderful endeavor. Please speak with me if you want to know more.

Nonviolent Communication ...

Nonviolent Communication seeks to teach us how to:

- Change patterns of thinking that lead to depression, arguments, anger and violence
- Resolve conflicts peacefully, whether personal or public, domestic or international
- Speak in ways more likely to be heard and understood by others
- Set healthy boundaries and say "No" with strength and compassion
- Express anger fully, safely and respectfully
- Translate criticism, judgment, blame and other hard-to-hear messages into feelings and needs

Some basic premises:

- All actions are attempts to meet needs
- Human needs are universal we all have the same needs
- Feelings result from needs being either met or unmet – when needs are met we feel happy,_pleased, etc. – when needs are unmet we feel sad, hurt, anxious, scared, angry, etc.

We are offering two **Practice Groups**.

- Introduction to Nonviolent Communication for those without experience with NVC, but open to anyone, will meet the second and fourth Wednesdays, 10:30am to 12:30pm.
- Group that meets on the first and third Fridays, 10:15 a.m-12:15 p.m is for those who have taken at least Level I training and/or been in a practice group. We encourage people who wish to join the Practice Group to take a training as soon as possible.
